Semester System (with CBCS) in Philosophy

w.e.f. 2016-2017

The entire course for the P.G. syllabus in Philosophy will be taught in two years and four Semesters. Each Semester will carry 200 marks. Total marks to be covered in four Semesters will be $4 \times 200 = 800$ marks. 14 courses from home department and 2 courses from other department/discipline.

10 Core Courses, 4 optional courses and 2 CBCS courses will be taught. 4 courses (200 marks in total) will be taught in each Semester. For each course 50 marks (40 for written test and 10 for internal assessment) will be allotted.

Each course will be divided into 2 units. Unit-1 and Unit-2. Questions for the written test (40 marks) will be set accordingly.

4 + 4 courses of Semester-I and Semester-II, and 2 courses of Semester-III and 2 courses of Semester-IV will be allotted for core area. 2 courses of Semester-III and 2 courses of Semester-IV will be allotted for optional area. One course in Second Semester and one course in Third Semester (50+50) will be taught as elective courses following CBCS.

At present only 4 optional courses will be offered – AdvaitaVedānta (ADV), Advanced Logic (ADL), Applied Philosophy (AP) and Philosophy of Cognitive Science (PCS). There will be restriction in opting these courses.

A student shall have to opt 2 courses of AdvaitaVedānta (Mark 50 + 50) or 2 courses of Advanced Logic (Marks 50 + 50) and 2 courses of Applied Philosophy (Mark 50 + 50) or 2 courses of Philosophy of Cognitive Science (Marks 50 + 50)
